The Staff hopes that THE ZOOKEY will be a "Treasure Chest of Memories for You".

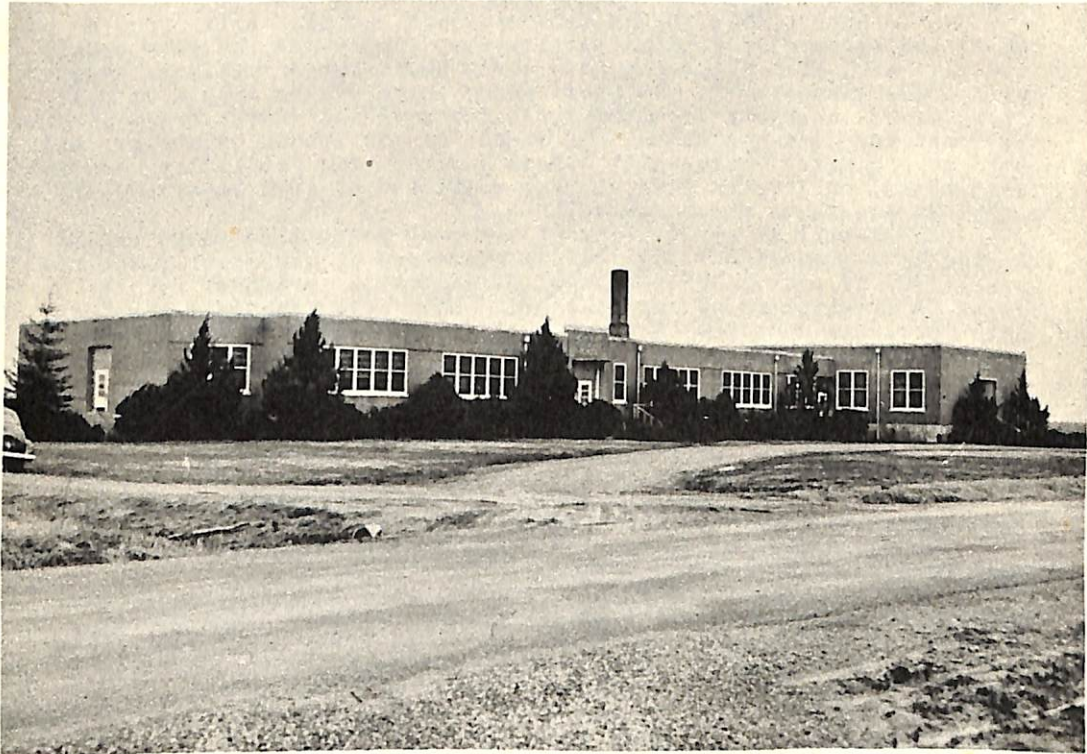

LOOKING AHEAD

As this is being written we are just beginning a building program which will add greatly to our physical facilities and which should enable the school to broaden its curriculum by making some practical courses available.

It is hoped that in the gymnasium our people will find a place where wholesome recreational activities can be had the year round. We usually think of a gymnasium as a place where indoor athletic events are held. The gymnasium is the place where these events should be held, and it is hoped that our boys and girls can have the finest teams possible. We trust that the young men and women of the school district will be able to organize basket-ball teams and use the facilities available. Good basket-ball teams that display a spirit of true sportsmanship are distinct assets to their communities.

Basket-ball is merely one of the many activities which can be conducted in a gymnasium. The leading educators of our country realize the necessity of well balanced physical education programs for the proper physical development of our children. They also recognize the fact that this training received through physical education is a function of the public schools. Many modern schools today make use of gymnasiums and other recreational centers for an organized physical education program integrated with other regular school activities. We look forward to the time when our school can have a full time physical education director who will conduct a program which will afford every child in school the opportunity to participate in the activities most needed by the individual child. The gymnasium should afford adults of the community the opportunity to participate in organized recreational activities also.

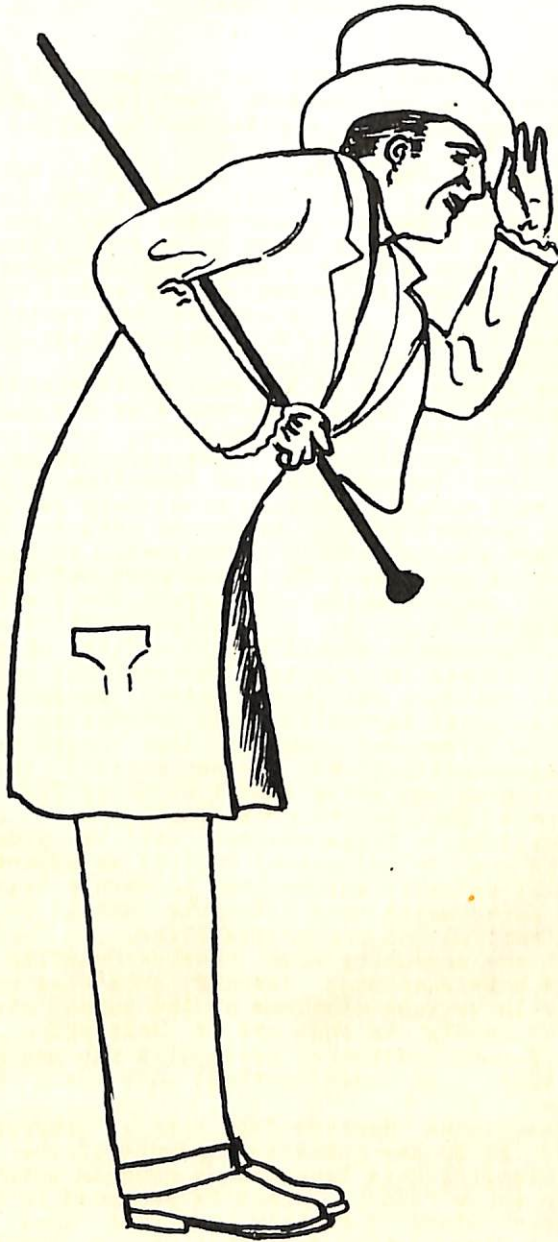
The vocational building will have modern equipment. Through the departments of Vocational Agriculture and Homemaking, our children can avail themselves of practical courses that should be very useful in later life. A recent statistical survey reveals that a very small per cent of the children who enter school at Holly Bluff ever attend college. This means that we are providing terminal education for the majority of our children. These courses will be practical and will enable our students who do not attend college an opportunity to receive something which will actually enable them to earn a better living. As a result of these departments our students should be enabled to live happier and more fruitful and productive lives.

The adults of the community also receive benefits from vocational departments. The home economics teacher schedules regular afternoon meetings, usually in various sections of the school district, with the ladies. New developments in the art of homemaking are presented at these meetings. The agriculturist meets with the men of the community at regular intervals. At these meetings they learn of the latest in scientific farming.

The advantages to be derived from such a program are numerous, therefore suffice it to say that the people of the Holly Bluff Consolidated School District have launched a program which is of inestimable value and one whose returns cannot be measured in dollars and cents. The map of our school district reveals the fact that our district is large. It further reveals the fact that we are isolated in that it would be most impracticable for our school to consolidate with any other school. These facts should be a challenge to all of us to make our school the best possible in order that it might provide the things which our people of the Holly Bluff School District need most.

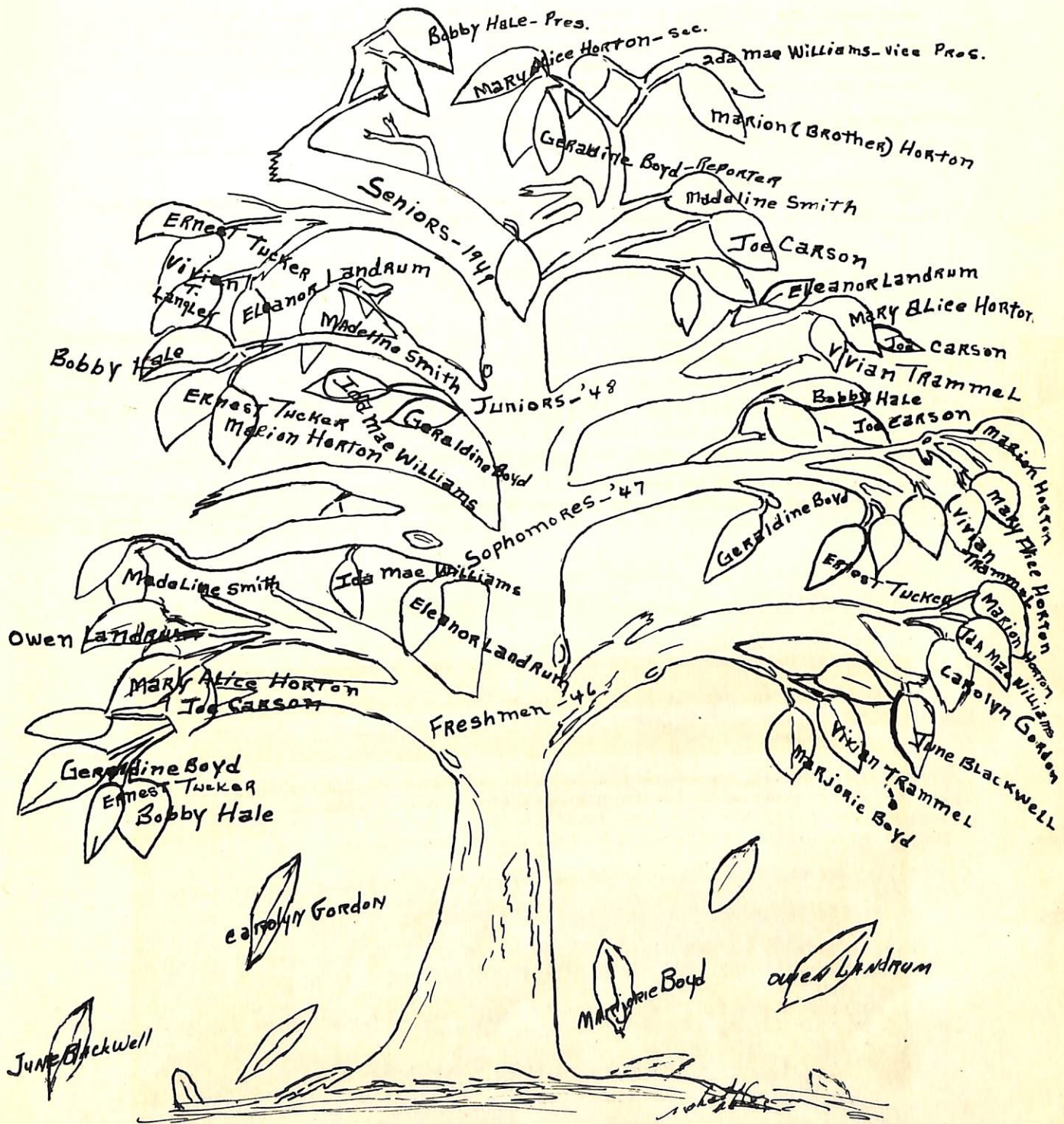
The grand finale is the Confederate Tableaux in which the King and Queen of the Pilgrimage, with their court, are entertained by the royal ballet.



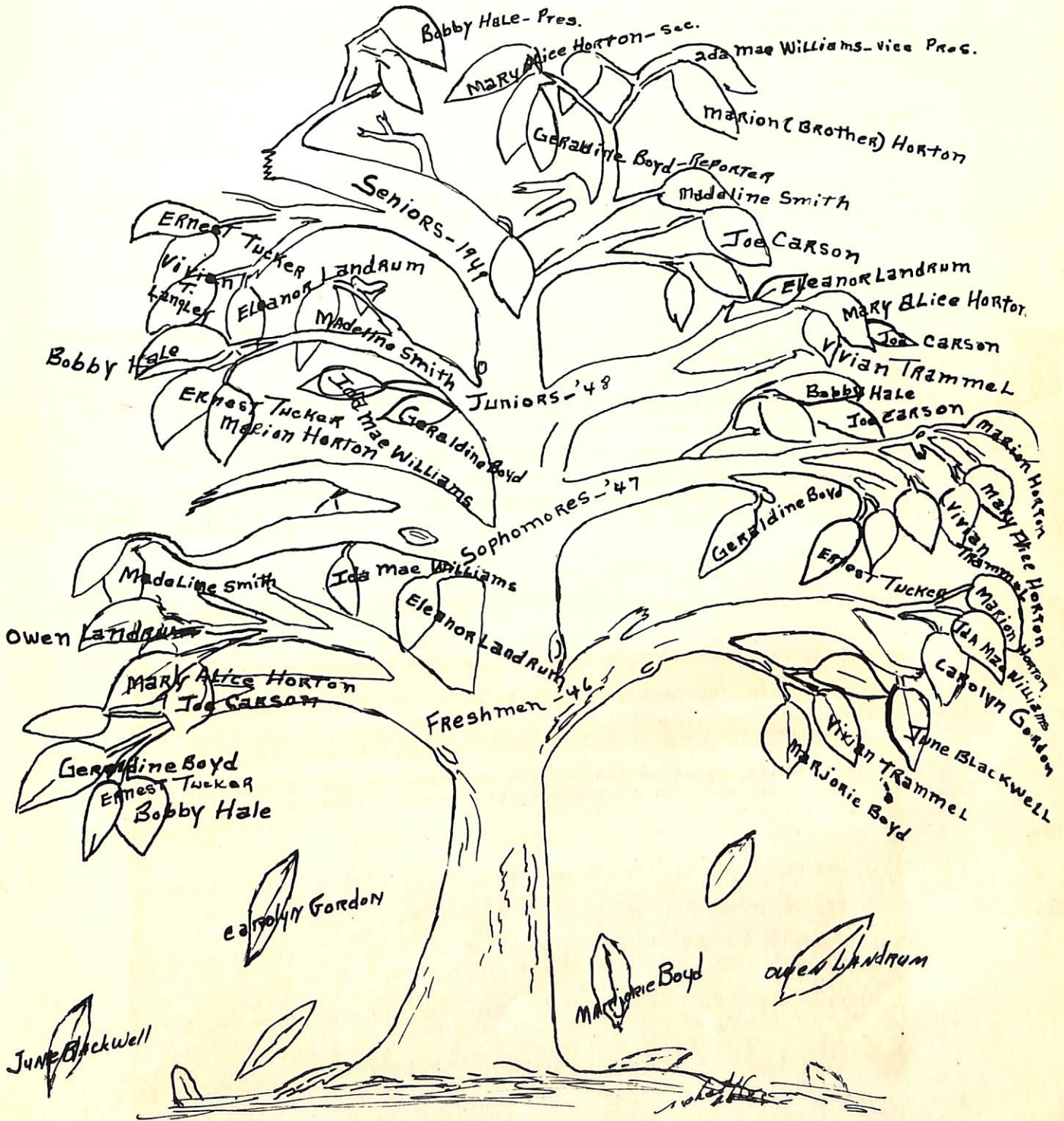
